ORDER denying [189] Motion for Order to Show Cause. The Court exercises its discretion to grant a temporary stay so that the parties may seek a stay pending appeal from the Second Circuit. See, e.g., U.S. Bank Nat'l Ass'n v. Nesbitt Bellevue Prop. LLC, No. 12-CV-423, 2012 WL 2033548, at \*1-2 (S.D.N.Y. June 5, 2012) (issuing a temporary stay for six days to allow an application to the Second Circuit to stay an order appointing a receiver for the duration of any appeal); United States v. lanniello, No. 86-CV-1552, 1986 WL 13778, at \*1 (S.D.N.Y. Dec. 4, 1986) (noting that the district court stayed its own "order [appointing a receiver] for fifteen days to permit defendants to file a notice of appeal and seek a further stay from the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit"). The parties must file a motion for a stay pending appeal before the Second Circuit on or before December 21, 2023. If the parties file the motion in a timely manner, the temporary stay will remain in effect until the Second Circuit decides the stay motion. If the parties do not timely file the motion, the temporary stay will expire. Ordered by Chief Judge Margo K. Brodie on 12/14/2023. (AF)
